Summary of completed DFA activities



Macro perspectives on the meat- and crop market

At the DFA webinar on 26 August, **Adolfo Fontes, DSM**, presented a status of trends in the world market for meat and crops provided with his usual overview. The Chinese market in particular has undergone major changes in recent years, especially in the pork area.

A rapidly growing world population and, not least, increasing purchasing power in Southeast Asia in particular lead to an increasing demand for meat - in the past year world consumption has increased by 1.1%, of which pork by 2.5%. The expectation is that meat consumption will increase from 580 million tons in 2020 to 700 million tons in 2030. And that the consumption of alternative protein sources will also increase, but that consumption still represents a very small proportion compared to the consumption of animal protein.

Pig production in China is back at a high level and has increased 10% over the past year. National consumption has increased by 3%. That change has led to a drop in Chinese imports of 50% from 2021 to 2022. The herd structure in China now has a far greater proportion of large farms than before. In June 2020, 22% of the units had over 10,000 animals per herd – in 2014 the figure was only 9%. That change has led to increasing Chinese imports of both soy and corn.

Pork price expectations reflected in Futures prices show a downward trend in the US and rising prices in China some way into 2023.

News from member companies

Actual Harvest info

Dan-Slovakia, Slovakia, Henrik Bækgaard Laursen, 18 October

We have finished the corn harvest. We harvest all our maize as CCM for the pigs, and the yield is 10.3 tons per hectare with 28% water content. This yield is approx. 30% below normal level and with large differences between the individual fields.

We have harvested a small area of sunflowers, which has yielded 3.1 tons/hectare, which considering the year, I am very satisfied with.

We also had a little soya area and again taking the year into account, 2.5 tons/hectare is satisfactory. It is interesting that, on an organic area with soybeans, we have achieved a yield of 3 t/hectare, as well as a reasonable economy. However, that area has also given us major cultivation challenges, primarily with weed control. **Crop prices** are still at a high level in Slovakia. We have secured enough grain for the pigs of a good quality and have sold the few sales crops, for example our sunflowers for 560 euros/ton.

Jasna-Pol, Poland, Jens Møller-Knudsen – 18 October

Harvest of late crops at my place includes Maize for silage (cow feed), CCM Crimped Maize for (cow feed), kernel maize for drying and Sugar beets. All corn is grown on old lakebeds and NEVER lacks water, the only drawback is small fields having many canals leading water to the pumping station.

Cutting of maize took place 20 - 25 September with a yield of 53 tons per ha., 28% dry matter. It is a yield of more than 12,000 feed units per ha. even that we set high stubble when cutting at min. 50 cm.

On Monday this week we harvested kernel corn for Crimping, yield 13.5 tons per ha. with 32% water. The remaining fields with kernel maize will probably not be harvested until November.

60% of the sugar beets have just been picked up and will be delivered later this week. Expectations for yield are > 80 tons per year. ha.

Crop prices are known to rise one day and fall the next at the moment. Kernel Maize costs 312 - 320 euros per ton ex farm. Maize silage has also become a market due to several biogas plants in the area, price of 40-44 euros unloaded from a finished silage stack.

Beets are settled in Poland like the rest of the EU at 35 euros per tons with a base of 16% sugar content. The sugar factory pays for the transport. In Poland, we get an additional approx. 440 euros per ha extra EU subsidy per ha.

The sugar factory (Polsukker) was nervous in the spring about whether enough sugar beet was sown due to the high grain price, fertilizer price, etc. Therefore, all beet growers for Polsukker received an additional 215 Euro per ha. sown sugar beet.

Short news from Abroad

European Parliament votes in favor of strong deforestation-free products law

MEPs have voted to strengthen key elements of a planned EU regulation on deforestation-free supply chains. The aim of the law, which was proposed by the European Commission in November 2021 and voted on yesterday, is to minimize the EU's impact on forest destruction worldwide by banning from the EU market products linked to deforestation and international human rights violations. The law seeks to impose supply chain due diligence obligations on companies that import and trade forest risk commodities, such as cattle, soy and wood.

EU consumption is a major driver of global deforestation. It is the world's second largest importer of tropical deforestation and associated emissions after China and is responsible for 10 per cent of world-wide deforestation associated with production of goods or services.

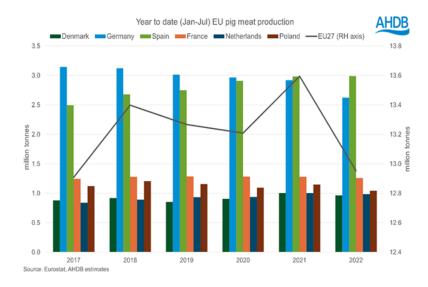

EU pig meat production drops on the back of low slaughter

Estimated EU pork meat production for June and July sits at 1.78 million tonnes and 1.66 million tonnes respectively. For June this is a year-on-year decline of 5.7% and for July a decline of 8.4%. This brings the estimated year to date (Jan- Jul) production for the EU27 to 12.95 million tonnes, the lowest volume since 2017.

For the six key producing nations, year to date figures show only Spain with year-on-year growth, albeit a marginal 0.2%. Germany saw the largest change year on year, declining 10.1% in 2022. Poland and Denmark also saw significant decline, down 9.2% and 4.0% respectively. France and the Netherlands were each down around 1.5%.



Hungary has completed PRRS eradication

Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome (PRRS) is a nagging disease that can substantially depress national pig performance figures. That is why the Hungarian authorities decided to embark on an ambitious plan in 2014: eradicating the virus from the country. Early in 2022 the programme was completed.

Extrapolating foreign data, a quick estimation demonstrates that PRRS infections in Hungary, with about 4 million slaughter pigs and 170,000 breeding sows, could cost roughly 5 billion Hungarian forint (about € 14 to € 15 million) per year.

6 ships with 154,000 tons of agricultural products left Ukrainian ports

On October 13, 6 ships with 154,000 tons of Ukrainian agricultural products left the ports of Great Odesa for countries in Asia and Europe. This is reported by the press service of the Ministry of Infrastructure.

- Bulk carrier DIGNITY left Odesa port
- WEI HE, YAF S left the port of Chornomorsk
- Vessels AK HAMZA, MARLEN, IRMGARD departed from the "Southern" port.

Since the departure of the first ship with Ukrainian food, 7.38 million tons of agricultural products have already been exported. A total of 331 ships with agricultural products left Ukrainian ports for the countries of Asia, Europe and Africa.

USDA: Decline in pork meat production in Ukraine

Last week, the US Department of Agriculture published a report on the production of beef and pork in Ukraine going forward in 2023. The USDA expects a sharp decline in Ukraine's production of both beef and pork in 2023.

For pork, a slaughter in 2023 of 6.349 million is expected. PCS. This must be seen in relation to an expected slaughter of 7.217 million. PCS. in 2022 and 8.340 million PCS. in 2021. Although the consumption of pork is also expected to be greatly reduced as a result of the war, the USDA expects continued significant Ukrainian imports of pork in the future. For 2023, the USDA expects Ukrainian imports of fresh/frozen pork to be 45,000 tonnes. For 2022 and 2021, the import is set to 65,000 tons and 52,000 tons.

New threats to the Russian agricultural sector

According to the Agriculture Ministry of Russia, more than 140 M mt of grains (101.9 M mt of wheat, 23.9 M mt of barley, and 2.1 M mt of corn) were harvested. Average grain yield is almost 30% higher than last year.

It is very likely these numbers are overestimated and the actual crop will be much lower. In addition, the weather in Russia was favorable during most of the growing season indeed. So, we do not ignore the official harvest data. This is why UkrAgroConsult raises its grain crop estimates for Russia.

Poor exports amid a bumper harvest leads to grain oversupply in the domestic market and consequently to a drop in prices. Moreover, farmers' profits are falling thanks to growing prices of plant protection products, spare parts and new agricultural machinery (including imported machinery and spare parts).

As the harvest progresses, Russian farmers face another issue: the existing storage capacities may turn out to be insufficient in view of record harvest estimates. Market participants already report that silos in some regions are full with grains to be stored on the barn floor. This deteriorates the quality of such grains even greater. Higher losses of Russia's 2022 grain crop are highly probable.

China. Under construction: A 26-storey pig house

In recent months, various websites have reported about a 26-story hog farm facility. This was taken into use in Ezhou, Hubei province, China. In the ongoing trend to build multi-storey pig houses, it surely must be one of the largest. Pig Progress took a deep dive. What is new so far?

The pig complex, once completed, is an ambitious adventure comprising 2 buildings measuring 26 floors, each measuring 400,000 m2. Owner of the project is Hubei Zhongxin Kaiwei Modern Animal Husbandry, which reports about its project on its WeChat account. The project is one of China's most modern pig breeding farms. It boasts labour efficiency, green ecology, and lower comprehensive cost.

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
